GOD GATHERS US

INVITATION TO WORSHIP — FROM HEBREWS 12:1-3

Therefore, since we are surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses, let us look to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising its shame, and sat down at the right hand of God.

Let us consider him who endured such hostility from sinful people, so that we may not grow weary or lose heart.

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PRAYING OUR LAMENT

Even as we fix our eyes on Jesus, we carry with us burdens of grief, worry, anger, and doubt. Rather than ignoring or denying those hard feelings, God asks us to trust Him with them, offering them to Him as lament. The Psalms are full of these kinds of prayers. As we experience the loss of our normal lives, the separation from each other, the dying of those who are sick, it is right and good for us to pray our laments to God.

PRAYER FOR RENEWAL — Psalm 42:1-6a

As a deer pants for flowing streams, so pants my soul for you, O God. My soul thirsts for God, for the living God.

When shall I come and appear before God? My tears have been my food day and night, while they say to me all the day long, "Where is your God?"

These things I remember as I pour out my soul: how I would go with the throng and lead them in procession to the house of God with glad shouts and songs of praise, a multitude keeping festival.

Why are you cast down, O my soul, and why are you in turmoil within me? Hope in God; for I shall again praise him, my salvation and my God.

PROMISE OF GRACE — Psalm 118:4-5, 14, 17

Let those who fear the Lord say,
"His steadfast love endures forever."
Out of my distress I called on the Lord;
the Lord answered me and set me free.
The Lord is my strength and my song;
he has become my salvation.
I shall not die, but I shall live,
and recount the deeds of the Lord.
